Van Wyck Connections A Word from the Pastor

A NEW CHAPTER After 3 years of waiting for COVID-19 to no longer be a global threat, I safely traveled to Israel March 7-16. I latched on with 4 other disciples from Unity Presbyterian (Fort Mill, SC) to tour the Holy Land with Educational Opportunity Tours. A total of 80 participants (5 pastors) gathered from churches in Florida, Virginia, and South Carolina. The whole was divided into three smaller groups: the Red bus, the Gray bus, and the Orange bus. Our 5 disciples from Fort Mill joined 19 disciples of two churches from Virginia (Pisgah UMC and Shady Grove UMC); together we were the Orange Bus and led by Hussam (Sam), our tour guide, and Reid, our bus driver.

Our tour went from the north (Sea of Galilee) to the south (Jerusalem) as we walked the ancient paths of Jesus' birth, life, ministry, passion, death, and resurrection.

The days were full as we toured by bus and LOTS of walking from 7:30am – 5pm. Each and every day I was simply in a state of awe to behold where the good news of Jesus Christ took place and was written about. The Sea of Galilee is so beautiful, expansive and holds so many biblical stories. It is there Jesus called the first disciples (fishermen), calmed the storm, invited Peter to step out of the boat and walk on water. After Jesus' saving death and resurrection, it is where Peter coped with depression (fishing), the Risen Lord made breakfast for the disciples, and forgave Peter's denial in order to prepare him to be the rock of the early church. And yet I found it incredibly ironic that the pier leading to the boats along the Sea of Galilee had a sign saying, "NO FISHING."

I was moved to tears visiting Magdala where Jesus encountered and healed Mary Magdalene and the hemorrhaging women (Mark 16:9; 5: 21-43). It is here that a chapel is dedicated to all the women of Jesus' ministry (1^{st} Century through today). In 2009 an archeological dig at

Magdala revealed a small community of homes, a ritual bath, a synagogue and the Magdala Stone, where the scrolls would have been placed, read, and proclaimed. Jesus' ministry took him to every synagogue on a regular basis and the Jerusalem Temple (3 times annually). Certainly, Jesus was there at the synagogue in Magdala to fellowship, preach, and teach as well.

Walking through the live archeological digs at Jericho and also Qumran (where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found) left me speechless. I saw where Jesus was tempted in the wilderness (the desert area of Jericho) and where God led Moses to see Canaan at a distance from Mount Horeb (across from Qumran).

My new adventurous heart jumped at the chance to float in the Dead Sea on a rainy and cold afternoon! There were no words as we walked the path where Jesus carried the cross throughout Jerusalem, even kneeling to touch the very stones of the 1st Century Roman street where Jesus carried our sins and shame.

Praying at the Western Wall (Wailing Wall) with fellow Jewish women was meaningful, emotional, and spiritually renewing. We have much to learn from our Jewish sisters' and brothers' devotion to God in prayer; it was beautiful. I am blessed to have taken YOUR prayer cards and prayed over them near the stone of Golgotha where Jesus died on the cross. And again, I prayed over our many prayer cards before tucking them into a niche in the Wall.

We entered the Upper Room where Jesus and his disciples feasted on the Last Supper. We visited the Garden of Gethsemane where Jesus prayed and sweat drops like blood. We stood in the Sacred Pit where Jesus was imprisoned to await his trial with Caiaphas. We walked through the streets of Jerusalem where Jesus carried his cross; I knelt and touched the very stones of the 1st Century Roman street where Jesus walked the Via Dolorosa (Way of Sorrow). We drew near to Golgotha where Jesus was nailed to the cross and died for our sins. We walked into the empty garden tomb believed where Jesus was buried and rose from the grave.

Our tour ended as we sat upon the "Teaching Steps," the remaining 1st Century steps from the Second Temple of Jerusalem where Jesus taught his disciples, the crowds who listened, and where Jesus debated with the Pharisees.

This educational opportunity has blessed me with friendships, many of which I consider "divine appointments" by God, as our shared conversations intersected our respective seasons of life in life-giving ways. I am blessed in that I heard God speak to me twice on the trip. And it goes without saying that this was a lifealtering trip which has deepened my faith, my devotion for God, and completely changed my reading of Scripture as I can now see these spaces of grace in my mind.

I will be sharing my pictures and stories of Israel and Jerusalem following Psalm Sunday worship April 2. I hope you are able to come as we all prepare for Holy Week and Easter.

Thank you, Session, and Van Wyck for giving me this gift to walk the ancient paths of our Lord and Savior. I am forever changed, and I am now more whole than I have ever felt.

Sabbatical 2023

It was in April 2022 that a trusted ministry colleague, who is retired from serving many levels within our denomination, and has been a mentor to many pastors and myself, suggested that I apply for the Lilly Foundation Clergy Renewal Sabbatical Grant. The Lilly Foundation awards a limited number of grants to pastors across denominational lines who are in need of a three to four month period of time away from the obligations of ministry to reconnect to God, self, and family to rest and be renewed in God's creative grace. In order to qualify for this highly competitive grant, a 10 page proposal and rationale is submitted with a theme for the Sabbatical, why it is needed, what it will entail, how pastoral leadership will be delegated in the pulpit and in the life of the church, a financial budget for the pastor's time away and the honoraria required for the church to fill the pulpit, and how the pastor and congregation are hoped to be enriched and renewed by this Sabbatical journey.

I am grateful that the session approved my desire to apply for this grant and that our congregation has approved my time away for Sabbatical this year. In writing my Sabbatical proposal I realized that I had not had a dream for myself since I dreamed of going to seminary 15 years ago. I am thankful to have received this grant in order to hear God singing a new song over me as I enter a new chapter of life and ministry with you.

My Sabbatical will begin the afternoon of Sunday April 16 (following worship and a Sabbatical send-off luncheon). It will end July 31 and I will return to the church office August 1.

The Session and I have worked together prayerfully and with deep intention to make sure our guest preachers are secured; ministry is planned by our committee teams for the spring and summer; spiritual leadership expectations among our Session's Ruling Elders are agreed upon; pastoral care is planned for weekly with an "Elder of the Week". We have also secured local ministers in Lancaster (colleagues and friends of Rev. Carson) within our Presbytery who are "on call" to respond to critical emergencies or death while I am away (I pray all at Van Wyck Pres remain well!!!).

The Session has a monthly rotation for serving during Sunday worship as "Elder of the Day." The Elder of the Day will open and close the church grounds each Sunday and greet the guest preacher. He or she is ready to respond to any needs in worship in addition to the Ushers who are serving. The Elder of the Day counts the weekly offering with the Treasurer or another Elder. The Elder of the Day will also serve as the "Elder on Call for the Week" to respond to pastoral care concerns. In the case of critical emergency or death, the Elder of the Week or Clerk of Session (Linda Pelletier) will contact our Minister on Call to respond and continue the pastoral care required.

The Session will continue to have stated monthly meetings for the dates of April 25, May 23, and June 27. A local pastor has been secured to moderate these session meetings per the Book of Order. The Session will not meet the month of July. An elected elder from the Session will also be attending the Sunday June 25 Stated Summer Providence Presbytery Meeting, convening at 2:30pm at Beth Shiloh Presbyterian (1184 North Shiloh Rd. York, SC).

Within our VWPC flock a desire has been organically expressed to re-instate our shepherding groups which were implemented in 2020 as the COVID-19 pandemic began. Our congregational list from the new directory has been divided into small groups with a designated Shepherd to periodically reach out to their small group, especially in times of difficulty or absence. Tony Flanagan has been working with VWPC disciples who have felt called to serve as a shepherd for a smaller group of the congregation. Our Shepherds are: Mary Baker, George & Mona Baker, Vivian Calcote, Annette Flanagan, Claudia Thompson, and Janesta Williams.

We have secured a wonderful array of guest preachers to bring God's Word every Sunday from April 23 through July 30. I am overjoyed that three pastors whom you already know well are bringing the Good News to you in this time of renewal for our congregation: Rev. Dr. Craig Butler (former Interim Pastor of VWPC), Rev. Gayle Montgomery (sister of Laine Ardrey), and Rev. David Brown (led us through the Shift Initiative in 2020 and 2022). I am equally grateful for local ministry colleagues from our Presbytery who are wonderful preachers with excellent pastoal experiences; they will be new faces to you: Rev. Megan Watson (former Director of Christian Education at Unity Presbyterian), Rev. Steve Simon (a retired pastor who is a frequent guest preacher within our Presbytery), and Rev. James Platt, newly retired pastor within the Presbytery. Some will be preparing sermon series. Each guest preacher is delighted for the opportunity to prepare the service along with Janesta

Williams (Director of Music) and Donna Fox (secretary) AND be with you in worship! I do ask you to support my Sabbatical by coming to worship weekly to be spiritually encouraged and possibly challenged by our guest preachers! They are as follows:

Lastly, I want to share with you how the Lord has led me to envision and plan out this Sabbatical. I am overjoyed to have time set apart to worship at various churches in different places; to be with my daughters, parents, and family; to travel internationally and in country; to pray and journal as I rediscover myself after divorce; to write more poetry; to take painting lessons; and to be utterly surprised by God's steadfast love and grace.

I will be traveling the following dates:

April 19 – May 4 to Scotland. My seminary friend and ministry colleague, Emma Ouellette and I will travel together to Glasgow Scotland where we will have a 7 day pilgrimage to the Isle of Iona to learn about Celtic Spirituality on a guided prayer retreat with John Phillip Newel (April 22-29). The remainder of our time in Scotland will be to explore Edinburgh and also Glasgow where I have learned I have ancestral roots within the Montgomery clan.

June 10 – 21 to Greece. I will once again travel with my friend Emma to Greece for a guided tour of walking the ancient paths of the Apostle Paul's ministry. This tour is through Educational Opportunity Tours. We will explore Thessaloniki, Philippi, Acropolis, Corinth, Cenchraeae, and Athens. Immediately after the land tour we will take a 3 - day Greek Isle Cruise to Turkey to tour Ephesus, Patmos, Crete, and Santorini. I cannot wait to experience the Isle of Patmos where John received God's Revelation, as we studied the New Testament book of Revelation during the pandemic for one year!!! July 1 - 8 to Santa Fe, New Mexico with Devon and Ashley. From Santa Fe, the girls and I will spend a week at Ghost Ranch, a PC(USA) retreat center to explore and hike in the desert, as well as engage in a multitude of creative workshops, such as painting, jewelry making, and guided hikes and kayaking.

Please know that when I leave the church after the Sabbatical Send-Off Luncheon on Sunday April 16 I will completely unplug from social media, ministry, and from communication with you and Presbytery. Please know I am not being rude if you email, call, text or message me and I do not reply. I am simply keeping my boundaries to honor this time away for Sabbatical.

Lastly, please be in regular prayer for our Session Elders who are the spiritual leaders of VWPC, our Staff, our guest preachers, our church disciples, and my family and me in this time set apart.

For many months now, I have witnessed God's Spirit stirring the imagination of our elders and disciples to engage in new opportunities, sptrengthen existing ministries, and prepare the way forward. There is SO MUCH EXCITEMENT and renewed energy among us. I am so very encouraged by God's faithfulness to VWPC and the good ministries that we share together.

Surely the Lord knows the plans he has for us in this time of Sabbatical – for each of us to lean into a deeper trust of God's provision and leadership. For the Lord is preparing the way to give us a future with hope and one that affirms God's desire to enrichen our well-being and the well-being of our surrounding community.

May God's name and presence be praised in this time of our collective rest and renewal.

"THREE, TWO, ONE; we are live". This is what is heard in our Media Room each Sunday morning at 10:55 am at (VWPC) Van Wyck Presbyterian Church. Then there is a quick prayer that everything goes well. At 11:00 am VWPC touches the world through YouTube and Facebook. We have an average of 8 to 10 households that watch and listen to our broadcast each Sunday. The two main people that are at the controls are; Clayton Massey and Jon McCalmont. Watching these two guys accomplish their tasks is like watching a ballet. Clayton is like a production engineer pressing an array of buttons that brings not only a picture to the screen but also text, hymn numbers and scriptures to life to all that are watching. Phasing cameras in and out is quite a creative art presenting various views, effects and moods. While Jon resembles a music conductor: meticulously orchestrating sound levels with up to four to five microphones on line. With his headphone on and listening intently, his fingers dance over volume sliders, adjusting and blending music and voice, not only in our sanctuary, but also in the Fellowship Hall and what is heard on YouTube and Facebook. This is quite a balancing act considering all the various levels of sound coming from pipe organ, piano and voice.

There is so much more that takes place prior to "Going on air" First, computer and live stream hardware is turned on, checked and adjusted, the sound board is activated, five monitors in the Media Room and two in the Fellowship Hall are turned on and adjusted, microphones turned on and checked. Then the bulletin, hymns and scripture text are all entered into the live stream equipment so our viewers can follow along with the worship service. However, sometimes the best laid plans go astray. We have had monitors go completely blank for no apparent reason, sound working fine in the sanctuary but not over the air, distorted sound, stuck cameras, screeching sounds, equipment failures just minutes before a church service. When this happens our amazing team goes into overdrive action, by the way, God is also on our team. Before long the problem is found, adjustments made and people barley knew we just avoided a major catastrophe. We just look at each other and say "thank you Jesus"

Let me give you a brief portraval of Clayton and Jon. Clayton was born in Charlotte NC. He is married to Holly and they have a daughter, Alena. They have lived in Lancaster for 21 years. Clayton came to VWPC 15 years ago with his parents. Clayton loves music and is quite knowledgeable on that subject; he is also a movie enthusiast. Clayton also serves on the Grounds and Maintenance Committee at VWPC. Jon was born in Houston TX. He is married to Jennifer and they have a daughter, Kate. They have been in Van Wyck for a year and previously lived in Indian Land. He and his family attended Transformation Church but after some research Jennifer found just what they were looking for at VWPC. They love to travel and work on their house and landscaping.
